Recognized throughout the region for its excellence, our program boasts a high placement rate for graduates. Mount Mary offers teaching programs for early childhood, elementary, middle and high school levels.

Undergraduate Programs of Study

Mount Mary offers three elementary (EC/EL) certification programs.

- **EARLY CHILDHOOD**: This license leads to a state license for teaching young children in preschool through grade 3 and covers ages birth through age 8. A minor is not required.
- **EARLY CHILDHOOD THROUGH MIDDLE CHILDHOOD**: Teachers licensed in this area generally work with children from birth to age 11 (typically Pre-K to approximately grade 6). A minor is optional.
- MIDDLE CHILDHOOD THROUGH EARLY ADOLESCENCE: This certification allows a teacher to work with students within a wide range of age levels from age 6 to approximately age 13 (typically 1st through 8th grade). Students choose a minor from: English, Mathematics, Spanish, Bilingual Spanish, Science or Social Studies.

To teach in a subject area, Mount Mary offers the following programs.

- **EARLY ADOLESCENCE THROUGH ADOLESCENCE**: Coursework and experiences in this area prepare teachers for work with students age 10 to 21 (typically in middle and high schools) in a specific subject area.
- EARLY CHILDHOOD THROUGH ADOLESCENCE: Teachers who work in areas such as Art and Spanish earn a license that covers the range of ages from birth through age 21 (typically prekindergarten through 12th grade). Students pursuing this license select a major related to the area of certification.

For students not seeking certification, Mount Mary offers the following option:

• **EDUCATIONAL STUDIES**: This program is designed for those interested in working with children at a wide variety of age levels, but not as a licensed teacher (e.g. day care centers, museums, zoos, etc.). It does not lead to state teacher certification.

Clinical Experience & Student Teaching

Prospective teachers complete approximately 100 hours of approved clinical experience prior to being admitted to student teaching. Student teaching is one of the most rewarding aspects of teacher education. It is through this experience that future teachers get a firsthand view of life as an educator.

Post-Baccalaureate Certification Program

All licensure programs are open to post-baccalaureates. Teacher education certificate programs are open to both men and women.

Graduate Program

Mount Mary's graduate program in education is designed to help early childhood, elementary, middle school and high school teachers strengthen their knowledge base, broaden their repertoire of instructional skills and pursue professional development opportunities. This 30-credit program is open to both men and women.

The graduate program includes several areas of emphasis for individuals who want to enhance their career. Mount Mary offers two licenses for certified teachers at the graduate level: 316 Reading (18 credits) and Adaptive Education (12 credits).
