Concentration: Justice Studies

Mount Mary University offers a unique learning environment for women interested in justice. The justice major merges Mount Mary's liberal arts core with an academic program designed to prepare women for entry into graduate school, law school, government service, nonprofit agencies or other careers that require a foundation in social justice.

Mount Mary's justice program provides a unique focus on addressing the needs of juveniles, women and survivors of crime through problem solving and restorative justice.

The major offers a multidisciplinary study of the structure, administration and dynamics of the justice system and a broader examination of the principles of justice in a global operation. Studies offer a basic understanding of the nature of crime and society's reactions to crime and build on that understanding through coursework in psychology, political science and sociology.

Coursework extends beyond the criminal system and incorporates all aspects of justice including peacemaking, advocacy, research and infrastructure change. Through interactive learning, students are introduced to research methods and theoretical models, giving them the tools to analyze social justice systems in their own community, the nation and throughout the world.

Prepared for Graduate School

Mount Mary's justice major provides a solid foundation for law school or future graduate study. Combining rigorous coursework, internship experiences and test preparation, Mount Mary graduates have gone on to complete advanced degrees at prestigious higher learning institutions in Wisconsin and throughout the country.
